





UPDATED Information Management Law Update & FAQ

A second ratification vote for Wahnapitae First Nation's Information Management Law is coming soon to carry out members' wishes for strong privacy protections and rights. Please use this FAQ for explanation of the most up-to-date information on the law and its progress.

Why is WFN making its own Information **Management Law?**

Uncertainty over applying colonial privacy laws to First Nations leaves members vulnerable. The proposed Information Management Law is a member-led solution creating strong, community-controlled data privacy and freedom of information rights. The law requires member consent for data use and sharing. Additionally, it protects member data, guarantees access to non-member records (when appropriate), creates a central registry for all decisions and policies, and begins a historical archive.

How does this affect me?

The proposed law strengthens your rights over your personal information by ensuring you:

- Know why your data is collected and that it will only be used for the intended purpose.
- Have the right to request and verify the accuracy of your own personal information.
- Are protected from your data being misused by other organizations.
- Can easily access relevant and acceptable records.

What if my privacy is violated under this law? There will be a process to report concerns or violations; in case of actual issues, the law allows for an independent, third-party adjudicator. The law also includes accountability measures to ensure privacy is respected and corrective actions are taken if needed.

Who can access records and what's in them?

The Registry will contain all Wahnapitae First Nation laws, policies, and Council/committee decisions, including plainlanguage versions to ensure transparency and participation. The law applies to all individuals within Wahnapitae First Nation, including leadership, committees, and staff.

What rights will I have under this law?

You have the right to know how your data is collected and used, to access and request corrections to your own records, and to be notified if your information is shared. You also have the right to access other acceptable records.

Was there already a vote for the Information **Management Law?**

An initial ratification vote for the law was held in March 2025. Although over 80% of members voted in favor, the results didn't count because the turnout didn't meet the ISC threshold (25% of the eligible voting population + 1). This imposed colonial threshold can deny the will of the people, runs counter to ANGA freedoms, and causes costly re-voting.

What are future steps?

With both member and council approval on moving to simple majority voting system, Governance staff are working with the Lands Dept. to plan a co-vote for early Information Management Law


I have been a frontline social services worker for over 30

years working only for Indigenous Businesses or Agencies both on and off reserve. Starting here way back when our Band Office was a portable trailer as the Health Programs Director, it gave me a solid foundation to move on to different opportunities. I worked for Native People of Sudbury Development Corporation for 8 years as the Native Tenant Liaison Officer, then the N'Swakamok Native Friendship Centre for 12 years as one of the Life-Long Care Support Workers. While still with the Friendship Centre I was hired to work part time as a Cultural Resource Worker for Kina Gbezhgomi Child and Family Services. I eventually left the Friendship Centre to work for Kina Gbezhgomi Child and Family Services as a Protection Worker in Child Welfare. I was recruited to come back to my home community for a brief time as Family Well Being Worker and Secondary Band Representative. My path led me back to KGCFS to work as a Jordan's Principle Service Coordinator where I was for the last 4.5 years.

Having the opportunity to not only live in my home community, but to work here as well to promote and support the revitalization of our culture is very near and dear to my heart. I look forward to sharing the teachings I have learnt over the last 31 years on my journey to cultural reconnection and continuing to learn with all of you.

Education Update

November has been an exciting month for the Education Department, continued with progress across multiple portfolios, partnerships, and infrastructure projects. Corbiere has officially begun clearing the designated area for the new Education building, as well as space for the future medicine garden. We are also pleased to share that the back area is increasingly becoming a cultural learning hub. On November 26, we hosted 48 students from Lasalle Secondary School for a full day of land-based teachings, including fire teachings led by Wally McGregor. Great Lakes Cultural Camps will be visiting in December with a focus on hunting and tanning skills.

At the school board level. collaboration is growing. Jamie and Marilyn attended the opening of École Notre Place and signed off on the board action plan with the French Catholic School Board . We are planning a mural project with Jessica Sommers for the new school in Spring 2026. Sudbury Catholic District School Board has also impressed us with their development of Indigenous programming, and we

forward to supporting their work further.

Staffing changes have taken shape. Chantal has accepted the role of Anishinabek Student Support Worker (ASSW) and began her duties on November 18. Two strong ASSW candidates were also interviewed for the Indigenous Education Outreach Coordinator (IEOC) role, and we are excited to welcome Bobbi Bob into that position as of November 10. Bobbi has already begun reaching out to local schools and planning land-

based teachings for youth in our cultural space.

In Post-Secondary, the WFN/ SINO Scholarship was awarded after two applications were reviewed: one student was successful. Students have also started submitting Winter Start applications, and we are reviewing feasibility and required documentation before approval. Several adult education requests have come in, along with two OFNLP computer requests. At the ONECA Conference, valuable



information was shared about Education Service Agreements and new tools for budgeting post-secondary funding. Nathan also officially become a LUNEC sitting member for the Chancellor selection process.

For the ASSW file the 2025–26 work plan is finalized and will be provided to Chantal upon her start. Organizational efforts are also underway to reformat student files into Ontario Student Record (OSR) format.

As for the Education Services Manager, onboarding and policy updates are progressing, with the finalized ASP Policy soon being provided to Chief and Council. A new High-Cost Special Education Policy is in early planning, intended to support assessments, tutoring and other needs.

We've also acquired a drone for use in the ongoing community profile book; it will also be used for photography and STEM learning in the YLP. A robotics team from a local high school will present at the hall on December 3, introducing robotics concepts to local youth and potentially sparking new interests.

Lastly, the RTP partnership has been renewed for 2026, with a Q4 meeting held on November 18. Final documents will be submitted shortly, and staff from RTP, including Jade and Evelyn Steele, visit WFN from December 1–3. Nancy recently attended the ILECC Resiliency Workshop in Sault Ste. Marie and continues to ensure all deliverables are met.

COMMITTEE CALL OUTFinance & Audit Committee

The eligibility criteria to be a finance and audit committee member is as follows:

- 1. The ability to read understand an analyze annual financial statements and the notes to the financial statements.
- 2. The ability to understand accounting policies, including any estimates used or judgments applied by management in the application of the accounting policies, when these are explained by director of finance and the auditor.
- 3. An understanding of the first nations objectives and operations that may impact the selection or application of accounting policies.
- 4. A knowledge and understanding of the strategies that have been adopted by the first Nation and the risks involved with any new strategies.
- 5. And ability to understand the first nations risk environment.

Re: Governance Procedures Policy Changes

As Wahnapitae First Nation (WFN) continues to grow and evolve, it is important that our policies reflect those changes, and especially how we operate through our Governance Procedures Policy.

This important document dictates the functions of the Chief, Council and the Executive Director – in addition to related meetings – but has not been amended since 2020. Much has since changed since then, and so WFN's legal advisors have provided a newer version that more cleanly and clearly captures how we can and should function; that version is included in this package.

Because this policy dictates the way that senior leadership operates, we wanted to ensure that you as members can review, consider, and respond to those changes. That is why this package also includes a general list of those amendments so that you can see for yourself what's being proposed.

Please note that these changes are only being made to better reflect the way that WFN operates, and to provide more clarity around the work that is happening on your behalf. The hope is to make Chief and Council more accountable, to make the administration more functional, and to make meetings more meaningful.

If you have any thoughts on the proposed changes, or if you wish to see a version of the document with all changes tracked, please contact Policy and Procedure Specialist Jordan Cheechoo at jordan.cheechoo@wahnapitaefn.com by Jan. 26, 2026. Your feedback will determine whether these changes will pass at the Regular Meeting of Chief and Council being held that same day.

We look forward to hearing your thoughts, as your participation and perspectives are vital to this process as we strive to build a self-governing Wahnapitae First Nation.

Ice Safety: Tips to a Safe Season



Ice safety is crucial across Canada, and experts like the Canadian Red Cross and the Lifesaving Society warn that no ice is 100% safe. Always measure and inspect ice before walking or driving on it.

Minimum Safe Ice Thickness (Clear, Hard Ice Only)

These minimums apply only to new, clear, blue ice. White or opaque ice (snow ice) is only half as strong:

- Walking/Skating (Single Person) 15 cm (6 inches)
- Group Activities 20 cm (8 inches)
- Snowmobile/ATV 25 cm (10 inches)
- Light Vehicle (Car/Truck) 30-38 cm (12-15 inches)

Grey Ice is Unsafe: Grey ice signals thawing or rot and must be avoided entirely. Ice strength is not uniform. Be wary of areas near currents, inlets/outlets, docks, and protruding rocks, as these areas weaken the ice.

Before You Go

- Use the Buddy System: Never go alone.
- Tell Someone: Leave a trip plan detailing your location and expected return time.
- Essential Gear: Wear a Personal Flotation Device (PFD) and carry a set of ice picks (claws) around your neck for selfrescue.

If You Fall Through (Self-Rescue)

If you break through the ice, follow these steps recommended by the Canadian Red Cross:

- Don't Panic: Control your breathing.
- Turn Back: Face the direction you came from, as the ice there was recently strong enough to hold you.
- Use Ice Picks: Drive your ice picks into the solid ice and kick your legs to propel yourself horizontally onto the surface, spreading your weight out like a seal.
- Crawl Away: Once out, stay low (do not stand up) and crawl or roll back toward shore to distribute your weight evenly.

Snow Goose and Capricorn

People born at this time, under the constellation of Capricorn, possess the ability to be practical and organized. These individuals have the potential to hold authority in what they choose to engage in. They will often find themselves in the position of leading a project or organization and if they do they may well approach it in a meticulous manner.

In Native American tradition the snow goose totem, found in the north on the medicine wheel, is used to represent the energy of these folk. The snow goose is quite a unique bird that chooses to follow the snow rather than the sun. Likewise individuals who are born at this time appreciate the purity of beginnings, a purity that may be far too limiting and lifeless for others. However the opportunities that come with such beginnings are a blank canvas, a huge potential for those who possess practical leadership qualities.

The Snow Goose is also a creature that is methodical. The Snow Goose, when migrating, may fly thousands of miles each year in a V shape. At the head of the formation is the female leader. The leader will be the strongest, she help to break up the wind for those who fly immediately behind her but slightly to the side. Her position is intentional as she does not obstruct the geese's vision behind her, but takes the main burden of any flight resistance that comes from the wind. The Geese directly behind her are the next strongest creatures in the gaggle. The geese that shadow take the burden for the geese that follow them and so on. This process could be seen to show the methodical approach as well as value of working methodically within an organization these individuals born at this time possess.

Snow Geese also adhere to a pecking order, within the gaggle, showing an appreciation of authority. The pecking order can be seen to symbolize the authoritarian Capricorn traits, as individuals born at this time can deeply value authority as well as possess it. The snow goose or Capricorn individual can possess practical meticulous authority. but in the process of attending to matters that they choose to engage in through having such qualities, they can become out of touch with their emotions. For this reason the Snow Goose individual can grow from following the wisdoms of the Flicker individual found in the south on the medicine wheel.




